The Board of Commissioners met in a **REGULAR MEETING** with Mayor Santiago presiding. Members present included Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas and Commissioner Cooper. City Solicitor, Brock Russell and Administrator, Regina Burke were also present.

Pastor Jack Fosbenner from First United Methodist Church delivered the invocation and led the salute to the flag.

Mayor Santiago made the statement required by the Open Public Meetings Act of 1975

“This meeting is being conducted in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act of 1975, was advertised, posted and made available to the public as required by Statute. The Municipal Clerk is directed to include a statement in the minutes of this meeting.”

City Clerk to Review Changes to the Agenda

Mayor Santiago asked if there were any changes to the agenda. Ms. Hitchner stated there were no changes to the agenda.

Bills

The following bills were ordered paid, when properly certified on a motion by Vice Mayor Parent and seconded by Commissioner Pepitone. The motion was carried by the following vote. Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Minutes

Vice Mayor Parent made a motion to approve to dispense with the reading of the minutes for February 18, 2020 Work Session, Regular Session and Closed Session. Commissioner Pepitone seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Public Comment on Agenda Items Only

Mayor Santiago stated that this is the time for any Public Comment on Agenda Items Only if anyone wishes to be heard.

Kirk Hewitt of Millville spoke about property taxes and the budget. He stated that 2% was going to be increased for EMS. He stated that 7 officers have been hired and left. He asked where the money was for these employees. He also asked where the money was from not having to pay for snow removal this year. Mr. Hewitt asked the Commissioners to vote “no” to the COLA Ordinance and instead make cuts and furlough. Mr. Hewitt spoke about the need for more police officers. He asked for two commissions to stop the COLA Ordinance from being approved and to get down to business. Mr. Hewitt stated he wants answers for this tonight and also wants to know where the Commissioners stand on this matter.

Betty Monteleone of Millville suggested tasking each department to cut 10% from their department. She stated the Commissioners don’t even look like they are listening to her when she speaks. She stated that she never felt so ignored in her life and she is 77 years old. She stated, “You just sit there and ignore.” She continued that she felt she should just sit here at the podium for the full 5 minutes and stare at them. Ms. Monteleone stated that there are people that can’t even buy coats or afford water or heat. She explained that she is disgusted.

Angeline Broomhall of Millville asked the Commissioners for transparency and wants to know where the Commissioners stand. Ms. Broomhall pointed out that the Commissioners were not even looking at her while speaking.

Lynne Compari of Millville asked if the CAP 2.5% raising is on top of the other 2% raise. She made a statement about taxes being so high. She explained that people will basically be making two mortgage payments a month. She stated that the Commissioners are using the excuse of raising taxes because of hiring police. Ms. Compari stated that this Commission wasted \$2 Million of taxpayer’s money from the demolition. Ms. Compari stated that this Commission has spent the surplus. She explained that the Commissioners need to do some homework and asked them to not increase the taxes.

Christina Pantella of Millville stated that the 3.5% COLA increase is going to hurt taxpayers of the City. She asked how many foreclosures we will have from this increase. Ms. Pantella also questioned the Recycling Position that is on the agenda.

Seeing no one else come forward, Mayor Santiago closed the Public Portion on Agenda Items Only.

Old Business

Mayor Santiago asked City Clerk if there was any Old Business. Ms. Hitchner stated there was no Old Business.

Petitions and Letters

Mayor Santiago asked the City Clerk if there were any Petitions and Letters. Ms. Hitchner stated there were no Petitions and Letters.

Reports of Commissioners

Commissioner Cooper

Commissioner Cooper reported on raising over \$6,000.00 from Snowflake Plunge held last Saturday. Commissioner Cooper spoke of paver repairs at Sassafras and Buck Streets. He encouraged feedback from citizens. He reported on the cleaning of 3 foreclosed properties and explained that they are a lot of work. Commissioner Cooper announced the Easter Coloring Contest with a deadline of April 3, 2020. He announced the annual Easter Egg Hunt at Union Lake Park will be held on April 4, 2020. He also reported on the Lakeside Walking Club.

Commissioner Pepitone

Commissioner Pepitone stated that he had nothing to report at this time.

Commissioner Udalovas

Commissioner Udalovas reported on upcoming Zoning Board and Planning Board meetings.

Commissioner Udalovas stated that revisions of the Land Use draft are continuing by professionals. She stated that examination of items of concern will be discussed. Commissioner Udalovas explained the process of the Planning Board Resolution and also CDBG program with new survey seeking public feedback. She further explained that this information is used for National Fair Housing Act. She stated that a link to the survey can be found on the City website.

Commissioner Udalovas gave information about two Community Gardens that will be constructed if Resolutions are approved at tonight's meeting.

Commissioner Udalovas gave some updates of recent Economic Development meetings. Commissioner Udalovas made a motion to receive and file Correspondence dated February 28, 2020 from Holly City Development Corporation regarding the Neighborhood Revitalization Developments and the February 20, 2020 Millville Economic Development Agenda. Commissioner Cooper seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Vice Mayor Parent

Vice Mayor Parent made a motion to receive and file the Annual Tax Collector's Report for 2019. Commissioner Pepitone seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Mayor Santiago

Mayor Santiago reported on the New Recycle Trucks. He also reported on the new trash schedule and explained that residents should be receiving information packets shortly as the new carts will be starting on April 1, 2020.

Ordinances on 2nd Reading

City Clerk read Ordinance No. 3-2020 on second reading Salary Ordinance for Cumberland County Council No. 18 Contract for Calendar Years 2020 through 2023.

Mayor Santiago opened the meeting for a public hearing on this ordinance only. Seeing nobody come forward, the public hearing was deemed closed.

Vice Mayor Parent made a motion to approve the ordinance on second reading which was seconded by Commissioner Pepitone. The motion was carried by the following vote: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Ordinances on 1st Reading

City Clerk read the following ordinance on first reading:

Ordinance approving and authorizing an application to the Cumberland County Roadway Department for the Millville Lightning Travel Baseball 10U to hold a Coin Drop on July 11, 2020 and July 12, 2020 at the intersections of Buckshutem and Cedarville Roads.

Commissioner Cooper made a motion to approve the ordinance on first reading which was seconded by Commissioner Udalovas. The motion carried by the following vote of Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

City Clerk read the following ordinance on first reading:

Ordinance to exceed the Municipal Budget Appropriation limits and to Establish a Cap Bank in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.14 for CY 2020.

Commissioner Udalovas asked for CFO, Marcella Shepard to give some information and clarification about the Ordinance.

CFO, Marcella Shepard stated that the Ordinance authorizes the City to go up to 3.5%. She stated that the 3.5% total is \$981,000.00 Ms. Shepard explained that the budget is not ready to introduce because numbers are still being crunched and meetings are still happening with the Commissioners.

Commissioner Udalovas spoke with City Administrator, Regina Burke concerning this and had questions. Ms. Burke explained that the COLA Ordinance accompanies an auditor's recommendation. Ms. Burke also explained that the passage of this Ordinance does not guarantee taxes will go up this amount.

Commissioner Udalovas stated that employee complaints are also an issue and if she cut her department the City would have higher risk of lawsuits because other departments might not cut and there would be discrepancies. She also stated that with Walsh Act form of government, there are not changes across the board with 5 departments.

CFO, Marcella Shepard explained that the majority of the budget is salary and wages.

Commissioner Cooper asked questions regarding the level of surplus. Ms. Shepard stated that she just filed with the State and it is around \$5.2 Million. She also discussed the legality of bonding vehicles. She stated that some do not agree and some are fine with it. She gave more details regarding bonding.

Lynne Compari asked if 3.5% is the maximum. Ms. Shepard discussed using previous years information and explained details of the surplus.

Joseph Sooy of Millville asked how much money was in the trust account for the past few years. Ms. Shepard answered that in 2018 there was about \$6 Million and 2019 there was about \$5.2 Million. She explained that \$1.5 Million needs to be made up this year.

Ms. Shepard stated that the Annual Debt Statement was filed at the end of January and will be put on the website for residents to review.

Kirk Hewitt asked how much money has been lost due to rateables. Ms. Shepard answered about \$3 Million.

Betty Monteleone asked why rateables went down. Ms. Shepard answered that this question should be answered by Brian Rosenburger, Tax Assessor.

Vice Mayor Parent stated that each Commissioner is responsible for their own department and their budgets should be submitted to the Finance Department. He encouraged open dialogue with the Finance Department.

Vice Mayor Parent made a motion to approve the ordinance on first reading which was seconded by Commissioner Pepitone. The motion carried by the following vote of Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

City Clerk read the following ordinance on first reading:

Ordinance authorizing amendment to salary ordinance to add a new title and salary range for the following:

<u>Title</u>	<u>Minimum</u>	<u>Maximum</u>
Supervisor Recycling Operations	\$25,000	\$69,653.71.

Commissioner Pepitone asked for clarification on this Ordinance. Regina Burke, City Administrator explained that this is part of grant money.

Vice Mayor Parent made a motion to approve the ordinance on first reading which was seconded by Commissioner Pepitone. The motion carried by the following vote of Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Consent Agenda

City Clerk read the following resolutions on the consent agenda which will be approved on one motion rather than individually:

Resolution No. 88-2020 authorizing Special Assessment of Municipal Liens for certain properties due to expenses incurred by the City of Millville relating to Board and Secure plus administrative fees in accordance with Chapter 11, Article I, Subsection 11-6 of the Municipal Code.

Resolution No. 89-2020 authorizing adjustments in the Tax and Utility Records.

Resolution No. 90-2020 authorizing Water/Sewer Termination on March 16, 2020 due to failure to comply with the utility ordinance pursuant to Section 56-18 of the Municipal Code.

Resolution No. 91-2020 authorizing a Recycling Partnership Grant Agreement between the City of Millville and the Recycling Partnership, Inc., for grant monies in the amount of \$148,000.00.

Resolution No. 92-2020 approving Military leave of absence and payment of pay differential due to a call up of active Military duty in the Air Force for Brian Day for the period covering April 4, 2020 to August 26, 2020.

Resolution No. 93-2020 approving Environmental Access Agreement between DeMaio's Inc., on behalf of the Delaware River Bay Commission as lessee and the City of Millville as owner for the purpose of removing two above ground storage tanks at the DRBA's expense.

Resolution No. 94-2020 authorizing memorandum of agreement between the City of Millville and Holly City Development Corporation to develop two Community Gardens on vacant lots owned by the City of Millville located at 420-426 North 3rd Street and 401 East Vine Street.

Commissioner Udalovas made a motion approve all items on the Consent Agenda which was seconded by Commissioner Cooper. The motion carried by the following vote of Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolutions

City Clerk read the following resolutions:

Resolution No. 95-2020 authorizing execution of deed for conveyance of real estate known as Block 355, Lot 7 located at 511 Buck Street to the Cumberland County Improvement Authority in the amount of \$1.00. Commissioner Cooper moved for the adoption of this resolution which was seconded by Commissioner Udalovas. The motion was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 96-2020 authorizing the CCIA to fund and prepare a Library Construction Bond Act Grant application for a \$6.5 million dollar expansion and renovation of the Millville Public Library and authorizing submission and execution of all necessary related documents by the governing body. Commissioner Udalovas moved for the adoption of this resolution which was seconded by Commissioner Cooper. The motion was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 97-2020 authorizing award of bid for the project known as "North 9th Street Water Main Replacement" to Garrison Enterprises, Inc, Vineland, NJ for their bid in the amount of \$503,375.00. Vice Mayor Parent moved for the adoption of this resolution, stating he is in receipt of the proper certification of funds. Commissioner Pepitone seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

New Business

Commissioner Cooper moved, seconded by Commissioner Udalovas to authorize Mayor Santiago to sign permission slip to allow the Cumberland County Department of Public Works and Mosquito Control Division to apply pesticides as needed by aircraft or ground unit (truck) in the City of Millville during the 2020 Spray Season. The motion was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Public Comment

There being no further business, Mayor Santiago stated we have now reached the public comment portion of our meeting. Anyone who would like to address the commission, please go to the podium, state your name, and address your concerns. Please limit your comments to approximately 5 minutes.

Kirk Hewitt of Millville thanked Commissioner Udalovas for her thoughts and answers and stated that he wished others would have provided the same. Mr. Hewitt stated that one of Commissioner Cooper's daughters does not go to Millville Public Schools. Mr. Hewitt also stated that he has seen Commissioner Cooper's endorsement for new political position. He stated that Commissioner Cooper is going to bail on the City after raising the taxes.

Angeline Broomhall of Millville stated that the new trash service Ordinance has not been amended still to include white goods and bulk waste pickup. She stated that residents were told they were going to be provided with education and training for the new trash system and they have not. Ms. Broomhall asked questions regarding the grant for the trash bins.

Ms. Broomhall spoke about comments from the last meeting from Commissioner Pepitone regarding the last Commission not raising taxes and it being the cause of the raising now. She also spoke about his comments on rateables. Ms. Broomhall discussed the how this Commission decided to end the volunteer Industrial Commission. Ms. Broomhall quoted Vice Mayor Parent from the last meeting stating, "Police Officers were wanted by the public and this Commission delivered." Ms. Broomhall stated that this is not true as the City has fewer police officers now than there was with the previous Commission. Ms. Broomhall asked that if 8-12 officers have left since this Commission, then where did the money used for their salaries go.

Ms. Broomhall stated that Doug Long is also constantly asking for more money and the City gives it to him. She asked Commissioner Cooper how Doug Long has assisted with his political career. Ms. Broomhall stated that the City is not any safer.

Joseph Sooy of East Main Street commented on CME and the Land Use Ordinance being a 400-page document. He asked why the City was using CME if they are out of Philadelphia. Mr. Sooy stated that another CME gives money to democrats in Cumberland County. Mr. Sooy stated that he does not understand how this Land Use Ordinance got drafted and asked for clarification. He stated that he feels that for the amount of money spent on the draft that it was copied from another township. He pointed out that there are words left in the Ordinance such as "Princeton" that were not revised or removed.

Mr. Sooy stated that there was a \$12,000.00 salary increase to one person in this room. He asked the Commission to look into this.

Betty Monteleone of Millville stated that she thought she was being nice and helpful. She stated that if you took politics out of the City then it could be a great place. She stated that you can see the mismanagement within the City. Ms. Monteleone stated that the City is taking properties off of the tax roll and this is the problem. She stated that people can't survive here anymore. She continued that the more mismanagement that happens, the more physically sick she gets. Ms. Monteleone stated that she feels that Commissioner Udalovas really tries and her heart really goes out to her. She added that Commissioner Udalovas is trying to make good choices for the citizens. Ms. Monteleone stated that this has been happening for more than 30 years. She added that this is the problem. She also stated that the way that the Commissions just sit at the dais is a disgrace.

Kevin Asselta of Millville asked questions about the water main repair Resolution. He asked if the asphalt is all included in the cost or separate. Mr. Asselta stated it is all patchwork and needs to be addressed. He brought up recent issues with sinkholes, sewage problems and bandaiding the problems.

Mr. Asselta asked questions regarding the budget and the 3.5%. He stated that the library is a great improvement. City Solicitor Brock Russell clarified the funding and financing for the library as well as the \$1.00 transfer for the medical clinic. Mr. Asselta asked if there was any commitment of the City. Mr. Russell answer no and that it is possibly a rateable.

Christina Pantellas of Millville commented on the new Recycling Supervisor position. She asked if it is being paid with grant money now, what happens when the grant runs out. She also asked if there will be a promotion or hiring to fill this person. Ms. Pantellas also asked questions regarding acquiring an additional trash can if needed.

Seeing nobody else come forth, Mayor Santiago deemed the public comments portion closed.

Comments by Commissioners

Commissioner Cooper stated that Mr. Hewitt is interested in him today. He stated that he was not at the Polar Bear Plunge due to two young daughters involved in sports. He addressed Mr. Hewitt's comments about one of his daughters not attending Millville Public Schools. Commissioner Cooper stated that this is not true.

Commissioner Cooper stated that each Commissioner is highly concerned about the tax burden on residents. He stated, "And as far as my campaign, it is my focus to do the best that I can for the citizens of Millville." He added that he wants to do his best for the County as well. He continued that he wants to do his best and be true. Commissioner Cooper offered to have a personal conversation with Mr. Hewitt to discuss any other issues that he may have concerns about.

Commissioner Pepitone stated that he did not have any comments at this time.

Commissioner Udalovas stated that she wanted to apologize for not making eye contact during some of the resident comments.

She also addressed bulk and white goods pick-up is courtesy of the City of Millville and that it is not in the contract with ACUA. City Solicitor, Brock Russell gave clarification as to where the Director of Public Works can direct regulations in the department as administrative regulations for flexibility. Commissioner Udalovas stated that literature will be provided and suggested a Work Session should be dedicated on March 17, 2020.

Commissioner Udalovas clarified some details regarding grants, general fund and the pay down of the grants.

Commissioner Udalovas answered some comments that were given by Mr. Sooy earlier. She stated that Sarah Birdsall placed the draft Ordinance together. She addressed the staffing issues with the large Ordinance. She stated she feels that a subcommittee should be formed to look at impacts of the Ordinance on the City. She stated that CME is looking at the Wawa tract to determine if it should be subdivided. She feels that Planning Board would agree with the subcommittee to include/remove items from the Ordinance. She added that if it cannot be enforced, then it should not be in the Ordinance. Commissioner Udalovas explained history of CME Associates in the City and their involvement in Planning. She stated that they were recommended by previous City Solicitor, James Schroeder. She added that they are also looking at structures, boats and RV requirements and gaining feedback.

Vice Mayor Parent stated that he is looking forward to more input on the budget and discussions. He added that it is going to be a tough budget and decisions need to be made.

Mayor Santiago explained that the City will be providing extra services as to the trash collection. He explained that the grant has not been received yet and that bond rules require any grant money goes toward paying down the debt. He asked if he missed any other concerns from residents from Public Comment. He thanked everyone for coming out tonight.

Adjournment

There being no further comments the meeting was adjourned on a motion by Commissioner Udalovas and seconded by Commissioner Cooper subject to the call of the chair. All were in favor. None were opposed.
