The Board of Commissioners met in a **REGULAR MEETING** with Mayor Santiago presiding. Members present included Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas and Commissioner Cooper. City Solicitor, Brock Russell and Administrator, Regina Burke were also present.

Pastor Jonathan Merki of the Millville Church of Nazarene delivered the invocation and led the salute to the flag.

Mayor Santiago made the statement required by the Open Public Meetings Act of 1975: "This meeting is being conducted in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act of 1975, was advertised, posted and made available to the public as required by Statute. The Municipal Clerk is directed to include a statement in the minutes of this meeting."

City Clerk to Review Changes to the Agenda

Mayor Santiago asked if there were any changes to the agenda. Ms. Hitchner stated there are two being:

1. The removal of consent agenda item #1 due to the lien being redeemed per e-mail by Tax Collector.
2. The addition of resolution item #8 authorizing agreement with CCSPCA for animal control services.

City Clerk also read statement concerning protocol for Covid-19 safety precautions to be followed during the meeting within the Commission Chambers.

Bills

The following bills were ordered paid, when properly certified on a motion by Vice-Mayor Parent and seconded by Commissioner Pepitone. The motion was carried by the following vote. Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Minutes

Vice-Mayor Parent made a motion to approve to dispense with the reading of the minutes for April 20, 2021 Regular Meeting. Commissioner Pepitone seconded the motion, which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Public Comment on Agenda Items Only

Mayor Santiago stated that this is the time for any Public Comment on Agenda Items Only if anyone wishes to be heard.

Tamara Isajiw of Millville addressed the Commissioners about the late addition of the resolution for the contract with the CCSPCA for over \$164,000. She questioned if the board had sought out any other options as this contract is a tremendous cost with the possibility of additional costs to the city. She expressed her concern for the homeless pet population but stated Vineland dissolved their contract due to the high cost, so it doesn't make sense for Millville to take on that expense.

Ms. Isajiw also expressed her concerns related to Economic Developments and stated there is huge disconnect between the responsibilities of Economic Development vs. what the Holly City Development Center offers. She read about what Economic Development is and reported the grants do not address the concerns. Ms. Isajiw explained the HCDC has been concentrating on Center City and has not contributed to Economic Development in any way. She expressed the Cumberland County Improvement Authority should be a good indicator that this is not a good fit. She questioned if the Commission has had any discussion with the City of Vineland since what they are doing is obviously working well. She recommended considering a serious consultant.

Ms. Isajiw said it is a shame that the city is losing the City Planner and the City Engineer at the same time but this could be a great opportunity to correct the many issues in those departments.

Seeing no one else come forward, Mayor Santiago closed the Public Portion on Agenda Items Only.

Old Business

Mayor Santiago asked the City Clerk if there was any Old Business. Ms. Hitchner stated there is no Old Business this evening.

Petitions and Letters

Mayor Santiago asked the City Clerk if there were any Petitions and Letters. Ms. Hitchner stated there is one letter from Atlantic City Electric:

Commissioner Cooper made Motion to authorize the Mayor to sign the letter of notification of the upcoming line clearance by Asplundh Tree Expert Company who will be performing tree pruning and removal services on behalf of Atlantic City Electric, Circuit #: NJ0214. Commissioner Udalovas seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Reports of Commissioners

Commissioner Cooper

Commissioner Cooper announced the construction of the dog park has started and thanked Dun Rite for donating 130 tons of sand for the cause.

Commissioner Cooper made the following announcements:

1. Irrigation has been turned on at all locations and watering has begun.
2. Grass cutting was completed for 18 properties throughout the city and is now in full bloom.
3. Union Lake Park has been cleaned up and mulched. Waltman Park will be done next.
4. Arbor Day will be celebrated on High Street by planting a Crepe Myrtle Tree on May 7th.
5. The annual Home Run Derby will take place on May 16th for 7-12 year-olds.
6. Family Fun workout class will be held at Buck Park every Thursday from 6-7 p.m.
7. Craft night classes are currently full, but you can still sign-up on the waiting list.

Commissioner Pepitone

Commissioner Pepitone announced his department is looking for volunteers to help with the PAL fishing tournaments being held every Tuesday afternoon of the summer months. He asked the City Clerk to put the schedule on the city website.

Commissioner Pepitone explained his concerns about the contract with CCSPCA. He stated there have been many meetings to address the issues, but the City received a letter from the CCSPCA stating they will be cutting all services if the bill is not paid.

Commissioner Pepitone agreed with Ms. Isajiw about her ideas on Economic Development and ways to improve the Department. He stated that it is very hard to find a good fit for Economic Development who knows Millville so he believes the HCDC will help the city in those areas since HCDC is all solid Millville professionals.

Commissioner Udalovas

Commissioner Udalovas announced the Zoning Board meeting on May 6th and the Planning Board meeting on May 10th.

Commissioner Udalovas explained the cannabis resolution passed at the last meeting and the additional items will be discussed. She stated municipalities have until the August 21st deadline to act on this matter.

Commissioner Udalovas explained the Neighborhood Preservation Program grant resolution on the agenda this evening and gave details of its goals.

Commissioner Udalovas responded to Ms. Isajiw's comments and explained the HCDC resolution is a result of many changes in staffing over the last three years. She stated the HCDC will be the first point of contact for all economic development projects and will be responsible for creating communication procedure to the city. She also explained their expected functions to the city will be to assist and fill the role of economic development, specifically naming Don Ayars and Heather Santoro. She stated they will also receive email accounts and provide needed support to the Engineer and Planner.

Commissioner Udalovas deferred to the Administrator, Regina Burke to elaborate on the decisions made to fill the staffing needs of her department. Ms. Burke explained that the search began in February and after many interviews and meetings they went with someone who has the necessary degree but not the municipal experience. She stated that this will continue to be a team effort for our new employee to learn from the professionals. She noted we have problems; we are down two engineers and we have our work cut out for us. Ms. Burke suggested that we give the HCDC a go and get started on helping our businesses make moves.

Commissioner Udalovas explained there has been an influx of inquiries pertaining to the industrial park and larger parcels of Millville, not just center city. She stated we are currently evaluating the parcels in our industrial park so we are ready to sub-divide and market to developers so they know we are ready to do business.

Commissioner Udalovas deferred to City Solicitor, Brock Russel to expand on this subject. Mr. Russell stated he has shared the Administrators concerns about major developers looking for answers and feels it is important that we have someone with the knowledge to respond when needed. He feels the HCDC is the best resolution at this time.

Vice-Mayor Parent

Vice-Mayor Parent expressed his condolences to Commissioner Cooper and CFO, Marci Sheppard on the loss of each one's mother and to City Tax Assessor, Brian Rosenberger on the loss of his father. He also congratulated Reverend Merki on being the recipient of the "Outstanding Citizen" award.

Vice-Mayor thanked everyone for their efforts in preparing the budget.

Mayor Santiago

Mayor Santiago thanked the city employees and fellow Commissioners for their dedication to the city during this time of adjustments.

Ordinances on 2nd Reading

The City Clerk read Ordinance No. 12-2021 on second and final reading authorizing continuing Environmental Remediation work and demolition of the electroplating building of the former Airwork facility group located at the Millville Municipal Airport and appropriating the sum of \$500,000.00 to pay the cost thereof, to authorize the issuance of \$475,000.00 of bonds to finance the appropriation and to provide for the issuance of bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance of bonds

Commissioner Cooper made a motion to approve the ordinance on second reading which was seconded by Commissioner Udalovas.

Mayor Santiago opened the meeting for a public hearing on this ordinance only. Seeing nobody come forward, the public hearing was deemed closed.

Commissioner Udalovas asked Solicitor Russell to explain the 4 party Agreement to the public explaining the reason for this ordinance. Mr. Russell explained there was a pollution problem in a specific building at the Airport that needs to be corrected and Millville is responsible for only 15% of that cost. The other 3 parties are responsible for the other 85%. He stated these monies should be enough to resolve the issue.

The motion was carried by the following vote: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

The City Clerk read Ordinance No. 13-2021 on second and final reading approving and authorizing an application to the Cumberland County Roadway Department for the Millville Soccer Association to hold a Coin Drop on June 12, 2021 and June 13, 2021 at the intersections of Buckshutem and Cedarville Roads.

Commissioner Cooper made a motion to approve the ordinance on second reading which was seconded by Commissioner Udalovas.

Mayor Santiago opened the meeting for a public hearing on this ordinance only. Seeing nobody come forward, the public hearing was deemed closed.

The motion was carried by the following vote: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Ordinances on 1st Reading

The City Clerk read the following ordinance on first reading:

Ordinance amending the City of Millville Code, Chapter 8 (“Animal Control”), Section 2 (“Definitions”) to broaden the definition of “Owner”.

Vice-Mayor Parent made a motion to approve the ordinance on first reading, which was seconded by Commissioner Pepitone. The motion was carried by the following votes: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas and Mayor Santiago

Consent Agenda

All matters listed under the Consent Agenda are considered routine and non-controversial by the Board of Commissioners and will be approved by one motion. There will be no separate discussion of these items unless a governing body member so requests, in which case the item will be removed from the Consent Agenda and considered in its normal sequence on the agenda.

Commissioner Udalovas made a motion to approve all Consent Agenda items, which was seconded by Commissioner Cooper. The motion was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolutions

The City Clerk read the following resolutions:

Resolution No. 119-2021 authorizing a public firework display to be conducted at Union Lake Park between the approximate hours of 9:00 p.m.- 9:30 p.m. on July 4, 2021 in the amount of \$12,500.00. Commissioner Cooper moved for the adoption of this resolution, stating he is in

receipt of the proper certification of funds. Commissioner Udalovas seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 120-2021 authorizing the City to apply for and obtain a grant from the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs for approximately \$60,000.00 to carry out a project known as resurfacing Waltman Park Basketball Courts. Commissioner Cooper moved for the adoption of this resolution. Commissioner Udalovas seconded the motion.

Commissioner Cooper stated the Waltman Park is in terrible condition and the upgrade has been requested by the public for some time. He stated he is hopeful to turn the area around with the approval of this grant for the necessary improvements.

The vote was carried by the following: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 121-2021 authorizing award of Professional Service Contract with the Holly City Development Corporation to provide Economic Development Services to the City awarded pursuant to a Non-Fair and Open process in an amount not to exceed \$48,000.00 for the period covering May 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021. Commissioner Udalovas moved for the adoption of this resolution, stating she is in receipt of the proper certification of funds. Commissioner Cooper seconded the motion.

Commissioner Udalovas stated she would like to echo the comments she made earlier this evening when discussing this resolution and responding to the comments made by the public.

Commissioner Pepitone stated he believes this contract is going to help put Millville back on the right path for Economical Development. He believes the HCDC really wants to see Millville improve and he is estatic to see them help make the needed changes.

Commissioner Cooper thanked Commissioner Udalovas and Administrator, Regina Burke on their hard work. He stated they took their time to fill the empty positions and believes the members of the HCDC, who have already established connections for us, will help with a smooth transition.

Mayor Santiago stated he also believes this is a good fit for the city and looks forward to the up coming developments.

The motion was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago. Vice-Mayor Parent abstained from voting.

Resolution No. 122-2021 authorizing the City to apply for and obtain a grant through the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs for approximately \$125,000.00 to carry out a project to provide assistance for neighborhood revitalization activities in the Center City Neighborhood with Neighborhood Preservation Program Funding. Commissioner Udalovas moved for the adoption of this resolution. Commissioner Cooper seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 123-2021 approving a Professional Service Contract through a Non-Fair and Open process with Holly City Development Corporation to perform consulting services in connection with the NJ Department of Community Affairs Neighborhood Preservation Program Grant Application in an amount not to exceed \$25,000.00 beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2022. Commissioner Udalovas moved for the adoption of this resolution. Commissioner Cooper seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago. Vice-Mayor Parent abstained from voting.

Resolution No. 124-2021 authorizing award of a Professional Service Contract through a Non-Fair and Open process with Advanced GEO Services, Corp to perform professional engineering services for on-call support for special projects of the City of Millville Water Utility in an amount not to exceed \$22,400.00 for the period covering April 20, 2021 through December 31, 2021. Vice-Mayor Parent moved for the adoption of this resolution, stating he is in receipt of the proper certification of funds. Commissioner Pepitone seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 125-2021 authorizing Professional Service Contract through a Non-Fair and Open process with Robert A. Verry, CPM, MLPA, MBA, to retain the services of a hearing officer to preside over and adjudicate police department labor proceedings in an amount not to exceed \$8,000.00 for the period covering May 1, 2021 April 30, 2022. Commissioner Pepitone moved for the adoption of this resolution, stating he is in receipt of the proper certification of funds. Vice-Mayor Parent seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Resolution No. 126-2021 authorizing the City of Millville to enter into an agreement with the Cumberland County SPCA & Animal Shelter Facility for animal control services for a one-year term effective January 1, 2021 covering through December 31, 2021 in an amount not to exceed \$164,346.00.

Commissioner Udalovas noted her reasons of concern on this resolution and asked Administrator Burke to elaborate on the matter. Ms. Burke explained that the letter from the CCSPCA was received late Friday, after the agenda was printed, but due to the urgency of the situation it had to be added. Ms. Burke stated the city has already received four months of service from the CCSPCA and have been advised the city would lose the animal services if this contract is not approved because payment is due for services rendered. She stated there is no other solution available right now, therefore the city has no choice but to proceed until there is a better option.

Commissioner Pepitone moved for the adoption of this resolution, stating he is in receipt of the proper certification of funds. Vice-Mayor Parent seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

New Business

Mayor Santiago asked City Clerk if there was any New Business. Ms. Hitchner stated there is one item this evening for a special event.

Commissioner Cooper made a motion to authorize the following Special Event on Public Lands Applications.

a) Memorial Day Parade on Monday, May 31, 2021 at 9am. Location: Mulberry Street to High Street to Rte 49.

Commissioner Udalovas seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote: Yeas: Commissioner Pepitone, Vice-Mayor Parent, Commissioner Udalovas, Commissioner Cooper and Mayor Santiago.

Public Comment

Mayor Santiago stated that this is the time for the Public Comment portion of the meeting if anyone wishes to be heard. He asked for comments to be limited to approximately 5 minutes.

Tamara Isajiw of Millville thanked Commissioner Udalovas for her candor and honesty about the HCDC, but she is still not convinced that this is the best option. She explained she feels Millville is not going in the right direction for this function, since there is no proof of

success with Economic Development. She stated throwing out names of former employees doesn't fix the problem and that she along with many others from our community, will be watching the progress closely because they feel this is a just a bad idea.

Ms. Isajiw recommended the Commissioners personally thank the educators and small local businesses who struggled to continue their services during the past year through the Covid-19 pandemic.

Joseph Sutherland of Millville, Coordinator of Millville Municipal Alliance, announced that he has been working with PAL on setting up a National Night Out along with gathering materials for guidance counselors to provide to our youth. Mr. Sutherland explained that MMA has lost 68% of their funding this year so he is hopeful that next years grant will bring more money to help the kids in our community.

Mr. Sutherland asked the Commission what the city paid to the CCSPCA last year.

Commissioner Pepitone responded that although he doesn't have an exact figure on what we paid last year, he knows the cost continually gets higher and higher. He stated the city will find a solution soon enough and we will no longer be taken advantage of.

There being no further comments Mayor Santiago declared the public comment portion closed.

Comments of Commissioners

Commissioner Cooper

Commissioner Cooper agreed with Ms. Isajiw that we need to thank the local businesses, teachers, residents, Police, EMT's and everyone else who weathered the storm of Covid-19. He suggested everyone give themselves a pat on the back.

Commissioner Cooper thanked the HCDC for starting the Community Garden and the people who came from all over to join at 4th and Vine Streets. He stated seeing all the kids and volunteers working together for one common goal gave him hope for the growth of this city.

Commissioner Cooper thanked the Youth Love Movement for adopting a park to keep clean. He stated this group funds itself with very little help from the city, but they still are out there making a change. He stated he hopes this type of involvement becomes a trend for others.

Commissioner Cooper announced Jeff Mills as the new president of Holly City Midget Football. He stated he attended sign-ups and the league received more participation than expected so everyone is hopeful for a fresh start.

Commissioner Cooper announced the Fireworks Celebration will be held on July 4th at Union Lake Park and will include music, vendors and food trucks. He also thanked the Revenue and Finance Department for bringing back revenue to the City with the recent tax sales.

Commissioner Cooper read a quote from Martin Luther King, Jr. about progress, sacrifice and struggle of dedicated individuals.

Commissioner Pepitone

Commissioner Pepitone stated this will be his 33rd year in education and guidance and this year was the most challenging for all. He agreed with Ms. Isajiw on the need to thank the teachers for their endurance.

Commissioner Udalovas

Commissioner Udalovas stated there was a great deal of information shared this evening and she thanked everyone who contributed to tonight's meeting along with all the viewers at home.

Vice-Mayor Parent

Vice-Mayor Parent expressed his joy when riding around the city seeing the children playing sports again and urged the citizens to go out and show their support. He stated it's not always about the "X's and O's" but about schooling, counseling, talking about religion and encouraging our youth.

Vice-Mayor Parent shared his gratitude to the businesses that have stayed open. He stated he was even able to get his first haircut after over a year. He stated so many lives were lost due to Covid and so much has changed but he is thankful for the advancement of technology which allowed us to keep moving forward. He thanked everyone for all the continued efforts.

Mayor Santiago

Mayor Santiago announced he received an e-mail from Megan Shepard of the Cumberland County Health Department letting him know there will be a free covid vaccination clinic at St. Paul Church on June 5, 2021.

Adjournment

There being no further comments the meeting was adjourned on a motion by Commissioner Udalovas and seconded by Commissioner Pepitone subject to the call of the chair. All were in favor. None were opposed.
